# Unsung hero, Aruna Asaf Ali

Also known as the Grand Old Lady of the Freedom Struggle, Aruna Asaf Ali hoisted the tricolour flag at the Gowalia Tank Maidan in 1942. When the British police led a search against her, she went into hiding and led the movement by starting an underground radio station, as well as seditious magazine called 'Inquilab.'

Aside from Quit bharat Movement, she was participated in the Salt Satyagraha in 1930. In 1932, she underwent a hunger strike to improve the living conditions of prisoners in Tihar jail. The fast-to-death resulted in a marked improvement of their living conditions. Aruna Asaf Ali took part in many nonviolent agitations during the Salt Satyagraha. For this, she was promptly arrested by the colonial authorities.

taught them all that he knew about patriotism, chivalry, and basic
manners that they must adhere to as they grow up.

His aim was to make them responsible and productive.

By the time the boys returned home, they were proficient in survival skills, camping skills, as well as the teachings required to make them good citizens of the nation.

The jagannath temple has 4 doors and Singhadwaram is the main door of entrance to the temple. While you enter the temple through Singhadwaram, you can clearly hear the sound of waves but once you passed the Singhadwaram you will no longer hear the waves sound. In fact you will not hear the Sound of waves as long as you are inside the temple.

Every day a priests climbs atop the temple which is as tall as 45 storeyed buildings to change the flag.

It is believed that if this ritual is ever missed the temple will remain shut for the next 18 years.

### Ram Janmabhoomi attack

2005 Ram Janmabhoomi Attack On 5th July 2005, five terrorists attacked the makeshift Ram temple at the site of destroyed Balori Mosque in Ayodhya, Bharat. Following the demolition of the Babri Masjid in 1992, a makeshift temple had been constructed at the Ram Jamabhoomi site. According to the Hinduism the site was the birthplace of the lord Rama. On 5th July 2005, the heavily guarded Ram Janma bhoomi-Babri Masjid Complex was attacked by heavily armed terrorists. The attack was foiled by Security officials, and the attackers were killed. The terrorists were from the Islamist organisation and they were believed to have entered Bharaath through Nepal. They posed as pilgim on their way to Ayodma. The terrosrists visited the temple at Ayodhya where they prayed, possibly to reinforce the impression that they were indeed pilgrims. The terrorists then drove the jeep into temple and forced the driver out of the vehicle, banging the jeep against the Security At 9:05 am, they hurled M67 grenades from 50m away to breach the cordon fence. Returning the gun fire, a platoon of 35 CRPF Soliders killed all five terrorists in a gun fight that lasted for over an hour. Three CRPF Soliders also recieved Serious injuries and as of July 2008 two remain Comatose. All the terrorists died within 100m of the Site. On 5th February 2020, the Government of India made an announcement for a trust named as Shri Ram Janmabhoomi Teerth Kshetra to reconstruct a Ram temple there. It also allocated an alternative Site in Dharmipur, Ayodhya to build a mosque to replace the Babri Masjid that was demolished in 1992..

At last, lily has all her life set up with Atlas Corrigan and her daughter Emerson.


